WAMY Joins Hands in Rehabilitating Dr.JL. Dube High School in Kwamashu

MY 67 MINUTES-YOUTH IN ACTION



The World Assembly of Muslim Youth (WAMY) in partnership with eThekwini Municipality (Department of Parks, Recreation and Culture), Department of Basic Education, and other partners and volunteers took time off their busy schedule to rehabilitate Dr. John Langalibalele Dube High School in KwaMashu.

The School which was established in 1978 is named after the first President of the African National Congress (ANC). This project was part of WAMY's Youth

in Action initiative to contributee to the commemoration off Mandela Day which falls on July 18th.

WAMY took on the task of replacing all broken window panes and painting. 1189 broken window panes were replaced giving the school a new look. 35 Volunteers worked at the school for 9 days. The main aims of WAMY's participation in this intervention are to inspire a sense of active citizenship, solidarity and community participation among young people and to involve them in shaping the future.
